A LIFE OF HUMILITY

The Bible has a fair amount to say about living a life of humility. "Pride goes before the fall," is the quip from the book of Proverbs. "Walk humbly with God," the prophet Micah reminds us. We hear a lot about the importance of being humble, but not much about how to actually go about doing so.

Perhaps a good first step toward humility is to admit our own shortfalls. Simply put: every one of us is far from perfect. So, we try to cultivate enough humility to ask God for forgiveness, for grace, for the opportunity to make our tomorrows better than our todays. It's one reason we often begin our worship with confession. In the words of St. Augustine, "If you plan to build a tall house of virtues, you must first lay deep foundations of humility."



Shon Hopwood is a convicted felon, appellate lawyer, and professor of law at Georgetown University Law Center, Washington, D.C. As a young man, he was sentenced to 10 years in federal prison at Pekin, Illinois after committing five armed bank robberies.

He was well known as a jailhouse lawyer, and became an accomplished Supreme Court practitioner by the time he was released from custody in 2009.
