# **GENEROUS LIVING**

Extravagant generosity: It's one of the core values of this church. It's the hope that every person lives with a certain inclination toward gratitude, since grateful people are generous people. Because God has given us an abundance of blessings, we live in such a way that reflects the idea: "You make a living by what you earn, but you make a life by what you give away."

As a perfect example of generosity, the gospel of John tells a story of Mary, who anoints Jesus' feet with expensive perfume. Her gift to Jesus likely had the price tag of about a year's worth of wages. And her offering didn't go unnoticed. It was so incredible that some were shocked, even a bit uncomfortable with such a gesture. But Jesus' response? He praised her commitment to generous living. And, in so doing, showed us an example of extravagant generosity we might choose to follow.

# St. Paul fourth-graders are preparing for their First Communion, on Maundy Thursday, April 18.

Communion, they learn, is one important part of faith - giving us Christ's promise of real presence as well as the forgiveness he offers.
