Hunger stones

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MISSION

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ome large boulders with carved inscriptions became exposed on the banks of the Elbe River in the Czech Republic a few years ago. A drought that lowered water levels to historic lows revealed rocks that have come to be known as "hunger stones." Inscriptions from the 15th to the 19th century, hand-chiseled into these sedimentary rock boulders, provide a remarkable meteorological chronicle from an age before more standard recording of weather took place.

The inscriptions carved into the rocks reveal a series of devastating droughts that hit Europe over the centuries. At different points in time, when the absence of rainfall created crop failures, a lack of food, and widespread famine, townspeople took it upon themselves to record their hardship. Onto these "hunger stones" are carved sayings with dates that mark droughts in the years 1417, 1616, 1707, 1790, 1800, 1868, 1892, and more. Among the more poignant inscriptions is one that reads: "Wenn du mich siehst, dann weine;" "If you see me, weep."

Visitors to these hydrological landmarks get to eavesdrop on devastating droughts of the past, events that meteorologists now predict will become increasingly common as the planet warms. Ordinary people with a hammer and chisel in hand sought to ensure that future generations would know what life was like for them.

St. Paul Lutheran has no log of meteorological events in its 140-year-history. We do keep record of plenty of other activities, however, storing them in a repository cleverly named "The Archives." That's a reference to the walk-in vault in the church basement where a steel door with a sticky combination lock might frustrate even the best of thieves.

Fascinating pieces of other eras rest quietly in these archives: Record of the church council's decision in the 1920s to remove the apostrophe "s" from St. Paul's, simplifying our name to St. Paul. The photo postcard of Teddy Roosevelt speaking before 6,000 people from the stage of the Central Park (today Vander Veer Park) bandshell on November 4, 1910. The 1901 photo of a horse-drawn trolley on Brady Street beside the hitching post and watering hole in front of our Church House property. The declaration by Pastor Miller in the 1930s that St. Paul would not engage in "money making schemes" (e.g. bazaars,



carnivals, tickets, fundraisers), preferring congregational giving that is generosity- and gratitude-based instead. The decision of the church council in the 1890s to give the St. Paul pastor a horse when the congregation couldn't afford a salary. And much more.

Items we add to the archives these years can seem uninteresting. Someday, though, our descendants will learn how we survived and rebounded from a pandemic. They'll read about our beloved Pastoral Residency program. They'll see when refugees from different countries began populating some of our pews; when cremation became more common than embalmment; when fabulous worship music reached thousands; when teenagers took trips to serve people with lives very different from their own.

Because church members don't line up to serve as volunteer archivists these years, we default to the next best option: We stuff artifacts into a mail slot across from the receptionist desk - a kind of purgatory where they await a someday-trip down to the vault. It's not a perfect method for securing history. But it's something. My hope is that future generations can peek back at our time and find themselves saying, "Those people in 2022 were beautifully generous in a cultural moment when it was difficult to be the church; faithful when so much of the population decided religion wasn't worth its time."

Council Notes

"It's a good time to be St. Paul," one church council member noted during its August meeting. Appreciation was expressed for the many who help St. Paul thrive.

In a major decision, Council approved a bid for the tear-off and replacement of all 15 zones of the church's flat roofs. Old and cracked surfaces have created frustrating moisture leaks inside. The 90-foot-high roof of the sanctuary tower will receive a new metal-seamed topping. The Capital Improvement Fund will cover the entirety of the

project's expenses. Work is to begin in October.

Council also approved a memorial committee request for \$6,000 to purchase new furnishings for the recently renovated childcare room. Plans are also underway to replace the 20-year-old playground on the north lawn. Council affirmed a preschool proposal to undertake this project early next summer using funds from a COVID-relief preschool grant received from the state of Iowa. Council also approved the hiring of Liz Franks (see below) who began her work on August 23.
