Tommy Fleetwood is a professional golfer from Southport, England, with a distinction. He has played the most tournaments and won the most prize money among all the pros who have never won a tournament. Fleetwood has teed it up on the first day 161 times and doesn't have a trophy. That's a lot of beginnings to count on the way to yet another unplanned outcome.

September marks a beginning for lots of people in many ways. Although actual start dates have crept earlier over the years. We still typically think of September as the beginning of the school year. For professional teachers, that brings the beginning of a new year in their careers. Many organizations and activities take a summer hiatus, with September beginning the new program year. Even in activities that ramp up during the summer—like St. Paul's youth ministry—September is when the new seasonal pattern begins. New school, new sport, new club, new job, new hobby, new resolutions—this Fall Guide arrives as a lot of beginnings are underway.

Each one comes with heightened dynamics. Expectation, hope, anticipation, and curiosity climb on the positive side; anxiety, uncertainty, discomfort, even fear—on the negative. Few, if any, beginnings come with any guarantee beyond the reality that the outcome is unknown.

Embracing the unknown in faith rings out time and again throughout the Bible. That's not just wishful thinking or blind trust. The biblical writers all tell the story of God and God's people with the advantage of hindsight. They tell the stories to encourage later generations to embrace uncertainty because of the blessings that came when the ancestors embraced it.

Abram and Sarai didn't know the land to which they were travelling; then they had to escape a famine there before they could really settle. Moses and Miriam and the Israelites left Egypt in the Exodus and only two people in that generation made it to the promised land forty years later. Ruth commits to her mother-in-law, Naomi, that "wherever you go, I will go." Paul sets out for Damascus to arrest followers of Jesus and winds up being "The" Apostle. As Luke tells it, even after Jesus "set his face to go to Jerusalem"

(9:51), there was a lot more for him to do and to teach along the way. These people all stepped into their beginnings and found the twists and turns of daily life and human foible in the story. The witness of faith also shows that they lived the story as God's people and



lived out the story with God's abundant blessings.

Tommy Fleetwood is neither naïve nor resigned about his long stretch of beginnings without trophies. He can speak frankly of disappointment, discouragement, and frustration. Along his journey, he has learned to take each beginning for what it is: the opportunity to take the professional game that he knows intimately and plays very well into the next arena. He knows that he cannot guarantee the outcome, yet he embraces the uncertainty for the sake of his relationship with the game and with his peers.

The beginnings to which God is bringing us this fall come with abundant uncertainty. Ignoring that would be dishonest, but succumbing to it in selfdefeat or disengagement would be foolhardy. This is the arena to which God has brought us, and we do not enter it alone. Not only God as creator and empowering spirit, but also the body of Christ that is our community of faith, journeys with us. Everyone in the body faces similar uncertainty; in the commonality of our not-knowing we can bind ourselves to one another for mutual support. Together, we will discover what these beginnings bring and, in turn, what new beginnings they will yet bring us.



Council Notes

Wednesday evenings at St. Paul expands this year beyond standard choir practices and confirmation events. New offerings include a weekly Bible Study, intentional parenting conversations, and childcare activities. A monthly meal will be held on the first Wednesday of each month.

The Mission Board approved funding for the creation of 50 food and care bags for those experiencing food and housing insecurities. This new "Mini Miracles Ministry" was proposed by a St. Paul child. Additionally, the Tapestry Farms partnership launches next week, with volunteers packaging fresh produce for Tapestry families on the fourth Tuesday of each month.

St. Paul moves forward on the process of calling a third associate pastor to fill out the pastoral staff and allow for continued growth and creativity. Council affirmed Personnel's recommendation to form an associate pastoral call committee for a third associate pastor position. Committee members include Ann Budde, Madison Castleberry, Jason Mahn, Joel Moore, Amy Paustian, and Peggy Wrzesinski. The anticipated timeline is approximately one year. A standard ministry site profile is in progress and will be approved by the pastoral call committee when they convene.


Council approved significant facility upgrades funded through the Capital Improvement Fund. The sanctuary tower project, including window replacement, will proceed with Bush Construction's \$266,225 bid and includes a 30year warranty. Additionally, council approved replacing two 18-year-old rooftop air conditioning units totaling \$61,450. The main hallway unit serving pastoral offices has completely failed, while the gathering area unit is experiencing heating issues and expected to fail soon.
